But when Queen Anne died in 1714 with no surviving children, not everyone was pleased with the elite's choice of monarchy. The German Hanoverians, who were distant Protestant relations of the exiled Stuarts, were brought in to succeed Anne. Hanoverian dynasty (great Britain). Under the terms of the 1701 Act of Settlement, on the death of Queen Anne on 1 August 1714 the joint crowns of England and Scotland fell to George Ludwig, elector of Hanover, a north German territory of medium size and power. He was the son of Sophie, the granddaughter of James I of England. George I, as he was styled in Britain, spoke no English and throughout his reign remained more attached to his native land (to which he frequently returned) than to his adopted kingdom, which he ruled until his death in 1727. He was succeeded by his son George II (ruled

The Early Hanoverian Royal Household 1714-1760. In 1714 George I was granted the same civil list settlement and the same ostensible yield of £700,000 as his predecessors. (fn. 1) The following year he secured the grant of a further £120,000 to make up for the shortfall which had become so pronounced under Queen Anne. Moreover, the statute of 1715 guaranteed the King's income for the first time: if the taxes appropriated in the act failed to produce the hoped-for total of £700,000, parliament was committed to voting additional funds to supply the remainder. (fn. 2) The Treasury and household King George I 1714 - 1727. When George arrived in England, he knew little about British politics nor could he speak very much English. George therefore became very dependent on the Whigs who had arranged for him to become king. The most important of these was Robert Walpole who became George's Prime Minister. George III was the first Hanoverian monarch to be born in England. He was born on 4 June 1738 in London and was the son of Frederick Louis, Prince of Wales, and grandson of George II. He was the first monarch since Queen Anne to put British interests well before those of Hanover. William died on 20 June 1837, without surviving children. His niece Victoria succeeded him. 1834 - Fire destroys the Palace of Westminster.
