The coastal waters of New Zealand are part of their huge migration route of 710,000km every year between summer feeding grounds in Antarctica and winter breeding in tropical waters. You can identify a humpback whale by their black bodies, which are mostly white underneath. However, there is the exception of Migaloo, the albino humpback whale who has been spotted in New Zealand and Australia.
